

This Webby-Award-winning website introduces students to the literature. life, and times of one of America's foremost writers. Through the interactive activities on the site. they explore Poe's worlds-both fictional and real-from a number of perspectives, examine the complex choices writers such as Poe make as they create their works, investigate the "hard facts" about life and death in Baltimore and the United States during Poe's lifetime, and learn about the continuing impact of Poe's legacy. The site also offers standards-based lesson plans. primary source documents, and links for further research.


